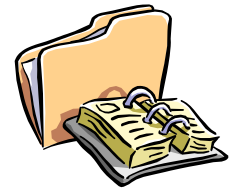


## A NEW ACCESS AND PRIVACY FACE

## 'RIGHT TO KNOW' WEEK IN SASKATCHEWAN



September 28 is recognized internationally as 'Right to Know' Day and is promoted to raise awareness of citizens' rights to government information in the interests of open, accountable and transparent government. The original access law was created in Sweden more than 200 years ago. The USA enacted freedom of information legislation in 1966. More than 57 nations around the globe now have such a law. The federal *Access to Information* law came into force in 1984. Since that time every province and territory in Canada has enacted a similar law.

Saskatchewan was the first province in western Canada to pass *The Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act*. This followed a report authored by former Chief Justice E.M. Culliton of the Saskatchewan Court of Appeal recommending such a law.

Saskatchewan, in tandem with the other Canadian provinces and the territories, has created a committee to organize 'Right to Know' Week to promote this worthwhile goal. In Saskatchewan, the week will feature many events that are open to the public:

- Official 'Right to Know' Week proclamations by the Government of Saskatchewan, cities of Saskatoon and Regina;
- Monday, September 25<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 p.m. – Regina Panel discussion at Regina Public Library featuring **Neil Robertson** (Regina City Solicitor), **David McLean** (Canadian Taxpayers Federation) and **Gary Dickson** (Information and Privacy Commissioner);

## CALL FOR NOMINATIONS FOR THE INAUGURAL CHIEF JUSTICE E.M. CULLITON 'RIGHT TO KNOW' AWARD



The intent of the award is to celebrate and to recognize leadership in promoting open and accountable government.

To be eligible, the body must be a Saskatchewan government institution (provincial government department, Crown Corporation, board, commission or agency) or a local authority (regional health authority, municipality, library, school, university or college).

The nominee should be an agency that has demonstrated some or all of the following qualities:

- Leadership in promoting public access to the agency's information;
- Creativity in building public awareness of access to information;
- Excellence in orientation of, and service training in, employee access to information responsibilities; and/or,
- Innovation in the development of tools to promote or facilitate access to information.

The deadline for nominations is **Monday, September 11, 2006**.

Nominations can be self-initiated or third party. The nomination should include:

- a letter of nomination (up to 1,000 words), and
- samples of materials relevant to the nomination (testimonials or other material).

The Award will be presented on Wednesday, September 27, 2006 during 'Right to Know' Week, September 25 to 29, 2006.

## A REALLY BAD HEALTH PRIVACY BREACH IN ONTARIO



Imagine you are in the middle of divorce proceedings at the time you enter the hospital for an operation. Imagine also that your estranged husband and his nurse girlfriend both work at the hospital to which you are being admitted. Further imagine that you make it very clear at the time that you are admitted that you do not wish your husband to have access to any of your information during or concerning your hospital stay. How would you feel to discover that notwithstanding your efforts, your husband's girlfriend was able to access all kinds of personal health information (phi) from the hospital's electronic health record and shared it with your husband. Well, that is exactly what happened to a patient at the Ottawa Hospital. This was the situation that our counterpart, **Ann Cavoukian**, Ontario Information and Privacy Commissioner, addressed in her Order HO-002. This is available online at [www.ipc.on.ca](http://www.ipc.on.ca). Commissioner Cavoukian found that the nurse used the complainant's phi and disclosed it to the complainant's husband contrary to the Ontario *Personal Health Information Protection Act, 2004*. Staff of the hospital failed to follow internal policies that specifically related to the protection of patients' privacy, and in so doing, failed to ensure the fullest protection of the complainant's phi. The hospital also failed to take immediate action to prevent any further unauthorized use of the complainant's phi, once notified by the complainant of the possible breach of her privacy.

Of note is the very slow reaction of the Ottawa Hospital to the complaint and the failure to immediately take steps to stop the improper use and disclosure of the complainant's phi.

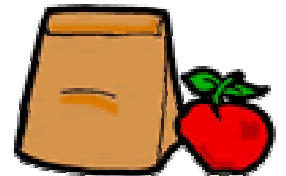
**CRIMINAL RECORD DATABASE – HOW IS IT CONTROLLED?**

## NEW PRIVACY LEGISLATION IN NOVA SCOTIA \_\_\_\_\_



In response to the threat posed by the *USA Patriot Act* and other outsourcing risks, the province of Nova Scotia has enacted new legislation. The *Personal Information International Disclosure Protection Act* provides specifically for the protection of personal information in the control of a public body or municipality when that data is stored, disclosed or accessed outside of Canada. There are serious fines in the order of \$500,000 for violation of the law. There is nothing comparable in Saskatchewan. As a result, British Columbia, Alberta, Nova Scotia, Quebec have all strengthened their privacy legislation to provide clear responsibility for outsourcing personal information reinforced by offence provisions and substantial maximum fines.
